

# Fun Facts about GFJ Library

## Celebrating 100 Years of Library Service in Endicott

**F**or 100 years, the George F. Johnson Memorial Library (formerly known as Endicott Free Library, Ideal Home Library, and Endicott Public Library) has been one of the best places in the Southern Tier to lose yourself in a good book, gain a new skill, meet up with friends, get help with your taxes, and so much more.

**George F. Johnson didn't establish or fund the first library.** A group of 40 residents raised funds to establish a free library association. One way they did this was by selling memberships for \$1 each. Johnson interrupted his vacation in January 1915 to send a telegram indicating he and his wife supported the formation of the library, stating, "will do all possible to assist."

**The library began in a hotel.** In 1915, Endicott Free Library opened in the Mattoon Hotel Building on Washington Avenue. The library had reading rooms for children and adults, a periodical reading room, and a meeting room. When hotel guests borrowed books, the ledger was simply marked, "guest." **1**

**Endicott Free Library had one of the Northeast's first bookmobiles.** A local resident donated use of his flatbed truck for the "traveling library." The truck operated two hours each evening on the north side of Endicott. **2**

**The library collected books for soldiers during World War I.** Over a three-year period, more than 2,500 books were collected and distributed to soldiers overseas.

**Books in Armenian, Czechoslovakian, Greek, Italian, Polish, and Russian sat alongside books in English on the shelves at Ideal Home Library.** The library also offered English-language classes for adults.

**A branch of the library operated on the north side of Endicott for 48 years.** Opened in 1920, the Hillside

Center Library on Odell Avenue served as a community center and library. Its offerings included reading clubs, story times, a play school, youth summer programs, classes, musical performances, and a club that taught kids about healthy habits. Endicott-Johnson also sponsored well-baby clinics at the center.

**Librarians staged plays.** On Nov. 15, 1920, the librarians presented *Little Women*, which they adapted from Louisa May Alcott's book. Intended as a single performance, a second showing was added that night because librarians didn't want to turn anyone away.

**Two librarians wrote a children's book in 1924 that is still in print today.** Ideal Home Library Director Margery Quigley and librarian Mary Clark authored *Poppy Seed Cakes* under the pseudonym Margery Clark. It's a story about a family on the north side of Endicott.

**In 1938, the Village of Endicott bought both library buildings from**

**Endicott-Johnson for \$50,000.** Today, that's the equivalent of \$832,348! Although it remained at the same site (and would until 1950), the name of Ideal Home Library was changed to the Endicott Public Library. **3**

**George F. Johnson's carriage house was used for classes and story hours.** The library moved into Johnson's former homestead in 1950, two years after his death, and was renamed George F. Johnson Memorial Library. The home's carriage house was often used for Harpur College classes and story hours. It also served as the temporary library during construction of the new library.

## Then and Now

**D**uring a century of serving the community, the library's name and location aren't the only things that have changed. Its collection grew from 1,300 volumes in 1915 to more than 90,000 today. But the biggest changes are simply the result of progress. As technology marches forward, GFJ Library continues to adapt, adding computers, online databases, digital archives, a mobile application, e-books and audio books, and other nontraditional library services. What hasn't changed? There are still friendly, knowledgeable librarians eager to assist patrons.

We celebrated the overwhelming passage of the vote to increase

library funding. We are able to continue to serve the public and maintain a full calendar of programs. Unwavering community support, good planning by our trustees, and a devoted library staff made all of this possible.

We completed the roofing project over the sunroom and front porch. We also renovated the book-sale room in the basement with the help of the Friends of the Library. We introduced new services like drop-in IT help with our adult services librarian and a new series of adult-learning programs (oil painting, drawing, Spanish, hand-quilting, and more). All

these initiatives were possible thanks to Town of Union voters. I am proud to work for such a thriving public library.

## Voters Approve Library Funding Increase

The November 2014 funding vote provided the first increase in funding for GFJ Library and YHPL since 2008. The 2014 vote was 8,004 for the proposition and 4,747 against, which is 63% in favor of the increase. There are 39 election districts in the Town of Union and the measure carried all of them. Thank you voters!
