PRESIDENT SPEAKS AT TY COBB STADIUM

On Wednesday, September 12, 1984, a president of the United States visited Broome County for the first time in over forty years. President Reagan's visit to Endicott included a brief tour of IBM and an address at Ty Cobb Stadium. The high school was closed to students and faculty, and a crowd of 25,000 people gathered outside in the stadium to hear the president speak. The Tigers' Pride band sat in the bleachers flanking the speakers' platform and played, "Hail to the Chief," for the President. Members of the Union-Endicott High School clubs and sports teams occupied the standing room below the platform.

ENDICOTT PREPARES

Preparations for the presidential visit began the week before. Approximately 200 phone lines were installed and the wrestling room was readied for use as a press room. A speakers' stand was erected in the football field and portable parts of the visitor's bleachers were moved to the end of the field for the visiting bands. Other bleacher sections were set on flatbed trailers flanking the speakers' platform to be used by the Tigers' Pride Band. On Tuesday the finishing touches were put on the speakers' platform.

Security was a very important and necessary part of the preparations. More than 200 police from local law enforcement agencies worked with the Secret Service. All gates to the stadium were closed at 11 a.m. for the final security sweep. Two dogs named Duke and Mac sniffed through the bleachers and the band instruments in search of bombs. The crowd of 25,000 passed through the metal

Later police escorted the President's motorcade from IBM Endicott to Ty Cobb Stadium via Washington Avenue.

Once the president arrived, the Secret Service took their places below the speakers' platform, facing the crowd. Meanwhile a helicopter hovered overhead.

CROWDS ARRIVE EARLY

To get good seats, crowds began to arrive as early as 9:30 a.m. Some brought lunches; others planned to buy food at the concession stands in the stadium. At 11 a.m. the stands were emptied for the final security sweep. People who had arrived early and taken seats in the stand had to leave and return again; this time passing, through the metal detectors. At 1:30 the gates opened again to admit a steady flow of people until shortly before the the president arrived.

Fifteen area bands performed from 1:30 p.m. until the president's arrival. The Union-Endicott Tiger's Pride Band and U.E. Choruses were among them.

Other entertainment was provided to warm up the crowd. The Fritzbusters and the Rubber Band were among the last acts to perform before the President's arrival. The Fritzbusters, a takeoff on this year's popular movie, *Ghostbusters*, amused the crowd with a political message. The Rubber Band played "Across the U.S.A.," a spirited patriotic song.









The President Receives Warm Welcome

It was a proud day for local Republicans, as well as for students of Union-Endicott High School. The stadium was filled with 25,000 people according to local police or 40,000, according to the Secret Service.

More remained outside the stadium.

The crowd welcomed President Reagan with enthusiasm; and although there were a few demonstrators, they were few and not organized. Demonstrators carrying pickets marched outside the stadium. Because pickets were not allowed inside the stadium, some demonstrators removed their signs from the stakes and carried them in their hands. Others remained outside during the event.

The President's motorcade drove down the hill by the Community Memorial Center, through the parking lot, and into the football field behind the platform. After members of the platform party had been introduced, the President entered.




The Message Upbeat and Confident

President Reagan spoke of the history of the valley — "one of hardship overcome, of determination, hard work, family, and faith." He electrified the crowd with the words, "Which way, E.J.?" With those words, the early immigrants to the valley were asking, the president continued, "Which way opportunity? Which way peace? Which way freedom?"

He praised our communities and industries today for the part they are playing in the computer revolution, which he said, "promises to change life on earth more profoundly than the Industrial Revolution of a century ago."

The President's lesson, not just for this valley, but for the entire nation, was on "opportunity, the chance to work hard and make our dreams come true." He believes, "the lesson of this valley is a lesson for the entire nation. With opportunity, there's no limit to what Americans can achieve."






Reporter annotates his copy of the text of the President's message (Top).




What Goes on Before 8:35? . . .




What Is School Really For?






Fashions '85

Hi, this is Luis DeVelasco from Spain. First of all I want to say that I have spent a great year at U-E. The school here is really very different from my school at home. One difference is that we don't have as much a free choice to pick whatever we want (classes, teachers. etc.). The studentteacher relation in this school is more friendly. Besides you are in a very large classroom (40 students) the whole

year. In Spain we usually have five periods in the morning (one hour each), and two in the afternoon. The lunch break lasts for 95 minutes and you can go eat at home or stay at school. The other thing is that the school in Spain doesn't offer so many facilities to practice sports. I think that the school in America is more practical, more fun, but is also less serious and difficult than in my country. This could be a disadvantage when you have to go to college.

When I was in Spain I only are pizza, hamburger, or hot-dogs once or twice a month. We have more variety of food, and most of them are cooked. Anyway we also have McDonalds

and Burger King.

When I tell someone that we don't have a drinking age, they tell me that they are excited and that they want to go to Spain. However there are not as many problems with drinking because you can drink whenever you want and is not as big a temptation as is here between the young people.



This year was a very special one for me. I was lucky enough to be able to attend U-E as an exchange student. During this time I really enjoyed getting used to all the things I knew differently from my school in Stuttgart, West Germany . I was amazed at the fairness, welcoming warmth and toleration of of the people I got to know. Certainly I learned a whole lot more

from all this besides a fluent English. I'll always be grateful to all the terrific students and teachers who made this such a fantastic experience for me.

I am a Rotary Exchange student from Johannesburg South Africa and I am living in Endicott for a year.

Before I arrived here in January, I imagined all Americans to be rich, fat and spoiled. After only a few months I have changed my opinion dramatically. Everyone has been welcoming, friendly and ready to make

my year as an American a fantastic experience for me.

U-E is very different to my school in South Africa. Last December I graduated from a school with only 800 students, so I was scared and shocked when I first stepped into U-E. I got lost everywhere I went, but fortunately my teachers understood why I was late for every class. I felt a bit of an idiot wondering around the building with a map.

It's great being able to wear anything to school instead of a plain and boring uniform. U-E has a very casual and relaxed atmosphere. We had rules saying girls had to keep their nails short and wear their hair in ponytails; no make-up was allowed. Boys had to keep their hair cut short, off the collar and above the ears.

The teachers here are so friendly, I'm used to calling teachers "sir" and "madam." So as you can see, for me U-E is a "job" (South African slang for a good time). American slang still seems strange to me and I've been through several embarrassing moments when people try to explain what certain words mean! I love American accents and could listen to you talk all day long.

I'm impressed by the wide variety of subjects that U-E offers and amount of clubs and sports it has. It makes for a great school with a lot of spirit. I know that I'm in for the best time ever.

Other Countries



"Oi", my name is Paula Casella, I'm from Brazil and my official language is Portuguese.

Down in Brazil, we have some different ways of living. For example, we go to school only half-day, we don't have study halls or lunch. Each day of the week we have a different schedule which is repeated every five days from Monday through Friday. Our school year is from February until the end o f November, our

summer vacation is December and January, and we have July for a winter break.

The houses in Brazil are made of brick and because of the warm climate we never need heat in our homes.

Since Brazil is located in the Southern Hemisphere, the seasons are opposite of those in the Northern Hemisphere. When it is winter there, it is summer here. Now when it is spring here it is fall in Brazil.

Our food has more spices than American food does, we have two hot meals each day and usually hamburgers are only for snacks in the afternoon.

My visit to the United States has been very rewarding. The people are very friendly and the school is great.

Hello everybody. I am Carsten Bjerre from Denmark, a very small country in Europe, it is very different from the United States.

You may have heard about me. I was on U-E's soccer team and helped them to a 9-8-1 record. I think it is a great thing to have sports in school. In Denmark, no schools have sports teams. You have to go outside the school to par-

ticipate.

I like your school system and I think it is better than ours. In Denmark, the teachers are more relaxed and so are the students. We work a lot in Danish schools and we have a lot of homework. We go to school from 8:15 to 3:15 in the afternoon.

We all know that being away from home is pretty hard and even the "toughest" boy will miss his parents and his friends. At Christmas, you will get homesick but after all it is only a year, and I have had so much fun in the USA. I do have to say that I am getting tired of hamburgers and snacks, though. Such foods cost much more in Denmark so I don't eat them quite so often when I am home in Copenhagen.

Attending school in America has been quite different from my experience in German public schools. The most noticeable difference between American and German schools is the length of the school day. In Germany, the school day begins at 7:45 a.m. There is no homeroom period. Students go immediately to classes upon arrival. After three 45-minute class periods there is a 20-minute "lunch" (brunch?) break. There are no studyhalls in the schedule, so the school day ends quiet early. After the break, students attend three more classes. At 12:50 all students leave the building for home, where they are to do assigned homework.

Another big difference between the two school systems involves placement of students in academic, trade, and basic levels. In Germany, all students attend elementary school until grade four. Then students are tested to determine which types of schools they will attend for the rest of their public school careers. Students who are assigned to the academic level will continue study through grade 13 in preparation for college. A second group will spend six years in preparation for trade schools. The third group is made up of students with various learning difficulties or students who expect to leave school early so they may go to work to earn money to help support their families. Students attending public school do not have part-time jobs like so many of my American classmates.

Students in Germany do not have wall lockers. They must carry all their books (up to 20) to classrooms. This is not such a big chore, however, because students usually spend all or most periods in one classroom. Teachers change.

An average academic student has four main subjects assigned: Math, German, English, and another foreign language. He may have up to six or seven other courses to attend during the week. Each day's schedule is different from other days of the week.

More Foreign Students

Our two countries seem to have the same major sport: football. Our "football" though, is what Americans refer to as soccer, the most popular sport in Europe.

We have many clubs, just as American students do, but the clubs are not related to the school program. Instead, the skiing, table tennis, gymnastics, and a variety of other clubs are sponsored by the towns. The clubs are active all year, so members may spend just an hour or less a day participating in the activities. Therefore, most students are able to belong to 2, 3, or 4 different activities.

In spite of the many differences between our schools, I have found it fairly easy to adapt to the different academic style in American schools. My classroom experiences, along with my participation in skiing, soccer, swimming, and possibly tennis, will be fond memories I will take home to Germany with me.

Hello, I'm Tanja Prochazka from Germany. My family will stay here for one year in Endicott. It was really difficult to accept the different lifestyles and traditions. But after a few weeks I learned it.

Well, the school is very different than in Germany. For example, we have school from 7:30 until 12:10 o'clock. Sometimes we have to go there also in the afternoon. And twice a month we visit the school on Saturday too.

The fashion is also different. Teenagers in my country can't wear as many jeans as here. They wear more linen.

One American girl asked me once, if the girls from Germany are better looking. No, the only difference is that the girls from there usually don't use make-up.

What I just noticed, that most of the American people, are really gentle and nice to us foreign people, and for that I want to say: "Thank you very much!!"

Our names are Carmen and Patricia Vargas (left to right) from Spain. We moved here to Endicott a year and a half ago.
Our school in Madrid was smaller in size, but we had people

of all ages, from Kindergarten through 11th grade (12th grade is usually done in an Institute). The classes have an average of 40 people, and through school life, the people in the class stays the same. In this way we really get to know each other, and it helped to build steady relationships among friends. We don't have the opportunity to choose our subjects. The study plan imposed by the Ministry of Education is the same for all, and there is a series of subjects we must take every single year. The teachers are the ones that move from class to class. We stay in one room the whole day. Our schedule is from 9:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. We go home for lunch, and come back at 3:30 p.m. for 2 more hours. The people in school live relatively near, and it's easy to go back and forth (from home to school). We have a cafeteria service in school, however, for those who cannot go home for some reason. The classes last for 60 minutes.

We have basketball teams, and karate lessons were being introduced when we moved. Sports are an important part of education, and they are having greater impact with the passing of the years.

If you take the atmosphere at school, plus the Mall's on a Saturday afternoon, you get a good picture of Madrid's streets full of people every day. Cars are mostly parked on the sideroads. There are more places to go, and transportation is much easier.

Our foods are more varied, with more flavor (I didn't say spicy! Mexican food is a whole different thing). It includes *fresh* fish, vegetables, meat . . . We have 2 hot meals every day. Hamburgers are not a habit of eating.

The music we listen to is very much like here. This is so different (starting from the language) that being here is a totally new experience. People are surprising and amazing.

We are having a great time, especially *this* year. I think U-E is a great school. Spanish class is so much fun, and the people too. We are keeping a good bunch of memories from our stay in the United States.

Love to all, from us.





Hi! Our names are Nyn and Thong Saviengvong, we came from Laos, Asia. In Asia, we lived in the city, the name of the city is Vientien.

In my country it is hot all year long. The temperature is 90 degrees and higher. We went to school half days from 8:00 to 12:00 noon. We didn't change classes like over here in America, we stayed in one class all day. But we didn't know about high school or college because we were in fifth grade when we left our country.

Our food is very different from American food. My people like to eat highly spiced food such as little green or red peppers, we have three meals a day.

Our house was made of wood and straw. There was no heat necessary. The houses in Laos are one large room divided into two sections. One section is a bedroom, the other section is a living room and kitchen. Some houses or apartments look like over here in America. Holidays are different from over here. I don't know how to tell about them because it is hard to explain. Over here in America we think it is a very nice country and we enjoy it.





Our names are Marco and Elena Gariboldi. We were born in a small town near Milano. Our town has 15,000 inhabitants. In Italy most of the people live in apartment buildings made of stones and iron. We start to go to school at 6 years old. We have 5 years of elementary school, 3 years of Junior High or middle school, and then 4 or 5 years of Senior High School. After Senior high we get a diploma. In Italy there are many different kinds of high schools and we can choose one of them. For example, we have:

"Liceo Scientifico: (Scientific Liceo) where we can learn a lot of scientific subjects;

"Liceo Classico" where we can learn about ancient civilization like Greek-Romans and we take Latin, Greek language classes.

"Liceo Linguistico" (Linguistic Liceo) where we can learn 3 or 4 foreign languages as: English, German, French, Spanish. All of these schools last 5 years. There is also "Istituto Magistrale" where we do training to become a teacher in elementary schools. This school lasts for 4 years and then we get a diploma. If someone wants to teach in Junior or senior high schools, he has to go to the University and study 5 or 6 years more.

I took a diploma last year in July 1984 in the "Instituto Magistrale." Marco will be graduating in 2 years. Our school days are different from here. The school starts at 8 o'clock and we stay there til 1:00 p.m. We go to school on Saturdays too!! When a person chooses a high-school he is compelled to take all classes offered by that school. In Italian schools, the students do not change classrooms, but the teacher goes to the rooms. We have the same schoolmates all four or five years of school. At the end of every year we have to take some tests for each class that we took. But at the end of Senior High we take a big exam with 2 tests and oral discussion about our whole years classes.

In Italy many people like to travel escpecially through Italy because there are many nice places to see. (Come to Italy!) Usually Italian people go to Sicily, Sardinia and South of Italy. But they also like to travel abroad to England, France or to the United States!

At 18 years the Italian boys must serve 1 year in the Army. After that, they either go to work or to the University. There are a lot of sports, the most popular is soccer. In fact, the Italian soccer team is the champion of the world!

Marco and I are making new friends and enjoying our stay here in Endicott.





- A: I wouldn't have stayed here fifteen years if I didn't like it!


 Students have always been very bright, alert, and involved.

The age of computers is upon us. As a result, Science is becoming a more popular subject. Many students have been taking all four years of Science courses in order to enter the fields of computer science and engineering.




25 Awesome Years For Coach Angeline

Upon graduation, he went on to Colgate University, where he played football again for four years and again became the captain in his senior year. At the age of 22, he became the youngest coach in the history of the Southern Tier conference.

By 1960, he was back at his Alma Mater, U.E., this time coaching the team in which he once played. He remained here for 25 years and we hope will remain for 25 more. In those 25 years, his Tigers have posted well over 70 wins and have had only around 18 losses and 3 ties. This record included 2 undefeated teams, 6 CHAMPIONSHIP teams and a team ranked NUMBER 1 in New York State. On September 22nd, 1984, the 25 former captains lined up on the field in TY COBB stadium to pay homage to COACH FRAN ANGELINE.


















Strike Up the Band






Varsity Club




